The Big Sick (2017):

Based on the real-life courtship between Kumail Nanjiani and Emily Gordon, *The Big Sick* tells the story of a Pakistan-born aspiring comedian with traditional Muslim parents. Kumail connects with grad student Emily after one of his standup sets. When Emily is beset with a mystery illness, it forces Kumail to navigate the medical crisis with her parents. *The Big Sick* is funny, heartfelt, and intelligent.

This is a true life story, starring Sally Hawkins and Ethan Hawke. Maud Lewis (1903–1970) was a Canadian folk artist from Nova Scotia. She remains one of Canada's best known folk artists. In 1930's rural Nova Scotia Maud suffers from rheumatoid arthritis. Because of her unusual gait from the arthritis, she is often mistaken as a stupid, incapable woman. She is the only applicant for a posted job as housekeeper for brusque Everett Lewis, a poor fish seller.



Lego bricks and Bionicle pieces will be available for your children to create with while you network with other families and explore our collection. All ages.




